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Scope and Content: The collection consists of some 140 letters sent to family members and friends by a soldier in the 11th Regiment New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry, Company D, during the Civil War. Stationed at various times in Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi, Tennessee, Virginia, and Washington, D.C., the letters refer to several battles, including Fredericksburg, Vicksburg, Knoxville, Battles of the Wilderness, Spotsylvania, Cold Harbor, and Petersburg.

The letters offer a window into the daily experience of a young union soldier during the Civil War. Writing to his siblings, parents, and friends, he comments on geography (with a farmer's eye), the weather, Army food, military pay, disease, battles, the condition, equipment, and behavior of soldiers on each side, and slavery. He records observations of major cities such as Baltimore and Washington, and of the way of life of the southern states in which he is stationed. He makes frequent comparisons to New Hampshire weather, soil, manners and attitudes, and shows devoted interest in the lives and financial well-being of his loved ones.

Biographical Background: Willard J. Templeton was born in Hillsborough, New Hampshire in 1842. He enlisted in the 11th NH Regiment on August 16, 1862 and mustered in on August 29th as a private. He was wounded in the arm at Spotsylvania, Virginia on May 12, 1864 (see letter dated May 17, 1864), and served as part of the color guard at the battle of the crater during the siege of Petersburg, Virginia. He was killed there in the mine explosion on July 30, 1864.

Provenance: Gift to the New Hampshire State Library from Mrs. Charles H. Walker, of Ware, Massachusetts, 4/18/1946.

Condition of the Collection: The letters are fragile and the writing is often faint, especially where written in pencil. Some of the edges have been worn away or torn. The typed transcripts themselves are brittle.

Collection Strengths: One of the primary strengths of the collection is the sheer volume of letters written by this optimistic, observant, and articulate young man. Writing between 3 and 11 letters home every month (except January of 1864), Templeton provides the reader with an on-the-ground experience of the campaigns and battles during 22 months of the war. When the undated letters are taken into account, the average is over 6 letters per month.

There are typed transcripts of part of the collection by Elsie Walker, which are invaluable to the reader when the originals are too faint, faded, or difficult to read.

Collection Size: .25 linear ft.

Span Dates: September, 1862 - July, 1864.

Copyright Status and Access: The collection is owned by the New Hampshire State Library and may not be copied or reproduced in any manner without advance written permission from the library director or designee. The collection does not circulate but may be viewed upon request.

Arrangement and Description: The collection is organized into five series, contained in one legal-size archival box and a folio.

Series I contains the original letters written by Templeton, organized into folders by date.

Series II contains oversize original letters, organized by date.

Series III consists of typed transcripts of some of the letters, prepared by Templeton's grand-niece, Elsie B. Walker.

Series IV contains photocopies of Series III.

Series V contains photocopies of some of the original oversize letters.

Regimental History and Service of the 11th Regiment, New Hampshire Infantry:

It is not part of the Templeton papers collection but has been included as an appendix because it provides a context and historical timeline which aids in understanding the papers.

The regiment was organized at Concord, mustered in September 2, 1862, and moved to Washington, D. C., September 11-14, 1862.

The Regiment lost during service 5 officers and 140 enlisted men killed and mortally wounded and 1 officer and 151 enlisted men by disease. Total 297.
