

Governor Robert O. Blood Papers



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Scope and Content Note:

The collection contains Governor Blood's official papers from his terms in office, his political campaigns, and his on-going participation in the political and governmental activities of New Hampshire. Included are speeches, proclamations, official messages and statements, correspondence, and projects, as well as photographs, and 19 scrapbooks of newspaper clippings from 1940-1945.

Biographical Background: [from NH Political Library finding aid; NH Division of Historical Resources website; and Wikipedia]:

Robert Oscar Blood was born January 10, 1887 in Enfield, NH. He received Bachelors and M.D. degrees from Dartmouth College and Dartmouth Medical School. He established a surgical practice in Concord and practiced for 56 years.

Dr. Blood served in the U.S. Medical Corps from 1917-1919 during World War I. He received the Distinguished Service Cross from Britain, and the Croix de Guerre from France. He helped to organize the Concord Post of the American Legion, and served as its first president. Dr. Blood served in the NH House from 1935-36, and in the Senate from 1967-40. He was President of the Senate during the 1939-40 term.

Dr. Blood was Governor of the State from 1941-45. During his tenure, World War II measures were initiated, such as the rationing of gasoline and the creation of a state council of defense. Also, a state employees' classification system was set up; a biennial budget plan was implemented; and the state deficit was eliminated.

Governor Blood married Pauline Shepard in 1916. They had three children: Robert Oscar Blood II, Horace Shepard Blood, and Emily Blood.

He died on August 3, 1975.

Provenance and Administrative History:

Governor Blood was the first New Hampshire governor to donate his official papers to the New Hampshire State Library. This event occurred in 1972. His papers had been processed by his staff member, William Chamberlin, under the governor's direction.

In March 1976, after Gov. Blood's death, additional materials and photographs were added to the collection, followed in June 1976 by the addition of his appointment books. In 1999 the collection was rehoused by Trina Purcell of the New Hampshire Political Library, which was temporarily located at NHSL. The majority of the news clippings, proclamations and public messages were organized into 21 scrapbooks by Harlan Pearson, a newspaperman with whom the governor corresponded in 1941 and 1942 (see folder 352 - especially the letter in which Pearson requests a large scrapbook and a jar of paste...). On August 22, 1991, the State Library accepted an envelope containing 103 photographs, donated by Governor Blood's son Dr. Horace Blood. A note on the envelope states that the photographs were given to the Blood family by Ed Labore, a newspaperman who worked for the Manchester Union Leader. These photographs are found in Series XIII.

The NH Political Library organized the collection into three record groups: #72 (1941-45), 73 (1952), and 74 (1951-). RG 72 contained speeches, documents, correspondence, newspaper clippings, printer matters, photographs, and appointment books, all from Gov. Blood's terms of office (1941-45), as well as some speeches given after 1945.

RG 73 contained materials related to Dr. Blood's 1952 campaign for governor.

RG 74 contained correspondence (1951-1955), newspaper clippings, and printed material, much of which related to Dwight D. Eisenhower's 1952 New Hampshire presidential primary campaign, and some of which related to Eisenhower's national presidential election campaign.

The collection was stored in several locations in the State Library and in 2014, the decision was made to bring all the record groups, photographs, and scrapbook volumes together and create a cohesive collection with a comprehensive finding aid that would respect the discrete donations and, where possible, the original order created by the governor's office.

The various documents describing the donations and the work done by the NH Political Library are included in a folder with the finding aid inside Box 1.

Span Dates: 1917-1972, bulk 1941-44.

Collection Condition: The papers were stored in 7 archival bankers boxes. Folders had been stuffed with far too many papers, resulting in tearing and wrinkling; papers clips and staples had rusted, and many pages showed evidence of water damage. The original documentation accompanying the 1972 donation states that the water damage was caused by vandalism in the Gov. Blood's medical office.

Two large scrapbooks contained proclamations, greetings, invitations, and official statements; these had been scotch-taped into the scrapbooks, usually several to a page, each slightly overlapping the one above it. The papers were sticky on top and bottom from contact with tape on both sides that had diffused through the paper. Many of these documents proved to be duplicates of others in better condition and were deaccessioned. Others required having their sticky corners removed; no text was affected. The papers were removed from the scrapbooks and placed in folders.

Nineteen large scrapbooks contain brittle newspaper clippings on acidic paper. Housing in a temperature controlled environment should slow the rate of decline.

Three items in the collection were moldy: The Executive Council minutes in Series III were housed in clamp binders which had moldy covers. The covers were removed, several pages were photocopied with the originals destroyed.

A second moldy item to be discarded was a copy of a report by Austin H. MacCormick on the New Hampshire State Industrial School in Series IV.B. Fortunately there was a second copy in good condition.

The third moldy item, a report in the Postwar Planning folder in Series IV.B also had moldy covers. These were removed and discarded. The affected pages front and back were photocopied and the originals destroyed. The report was rebound with cotton ribbon.

Collection Strengths: The collection is most useful as documentation of Governor Blood's four years in office, although it does also cover other significant periods in his adult life.

Collection Size: 7 archival "banker's boxes" (10.25" high x 12.75" wide x 16.5" deep, each) and 19 large scrapbooks (14.5" high x 11.5" wide x 2" deep, each) = 12.4 cubic feet, or 10.6 linear feet.

Copyright Status and Access: The collection is owned by the New Hampshire State Library and may be viewed at the library upon request.

Arrangement and Description:

The collection is arranged in 15 series, with some series also containing subseries. Description is at the folder level. The original order created in the governor's office was maintained, including use of the original archival folders and labels. In several cases it was necessary to divide the contents of one folder into two or three to prevent damage to the documents.

Proclamations had been relegated to a folder at the back of the collection called Miscellaneous, which also included biographical information on Gov. Blood. In additions there were two large scrapbooks containing proclamations, interfiled with other official messages. The biographical information was brought forward and obituary notices were added to it. The proclamations and messages were included in Series II with other official gubernatorial statements; the two scrapbooks were discarded.

Some inconsistencies in organization reflect that the collection has been processed and reprocessed by several individuals. Each speech has its own folder, for example, but proclamations are grouped together (formerly by subject, now by year). The campaign papers of 1952 had been processed at the item level; this level of detail did not seem warranted so the papers are described at the folder level in this finding aid. However, the original documentation of each item is retained in the finding aid folder.

Despite the fact that there are 19 volumes of newspaper clippings, many folders also contained numerous clippings tucked in with other items. Most of these were photocopied; others too large to photocopy were protected in archival tissue paper or envelopes.

Several folders were found to be empty and were deaccessioned. They were labeled as follows:
