edited by Amber Cushing, 2007; expanded, cataloged, and formatted by Linda Kent Technical Services, NHSL December, 2008 Scope and Content Note: The collection includes materials relating to Noah Cooke's work as a lawyer in Keene, New Hampshire, as well as his tenure as town clerk of Keene (1795-1804). The contents consist of court documents from cases dating from 1782-1821. These include, but are not limited to, copies of pleas, arguments, reports, and judgments. There is also Cooke's copy book of legal forms.

Biographical Background: Noah Cooke was born in Hadley, Massachusetts in October, 1749. He graduated from Harvard College in 1769 and went on to study divinity. He received his license to preach in 1771. From 1775 until 1780 he served as a chaplain in the Revolutionary War, achieving the rank of colonel. In 1780 he left the army and moved to Keene, N.H. Here he read law with Daniel Newcomb, Esq. and was admitted to the bar in 1784. After practicing law for several years, he became the town officer in 1792, town moderator in 1793, and then town clerk of Keene in 1795, a post he held continuously until 1804. He was the first president of the General Monadnock Society for the Promotion of Morals (1814) and was the librarian for the Social Library (precursor to the Keene Public Library) at the time of his death in October, 1829.

Provenance: The collection was donated to the New Hampshire State Library in 1899 by Mrs. Bennett H. Nash, a granddaughter of Noah Cooke.

Span Dates: 1782-1821, n.d.

Collection Size: There are 48 loose items in two folders, and one bound copy book of legal forms or declarations, housed in one legal-size Hollinger box (.25 linear ft.)
